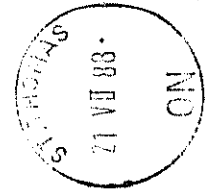

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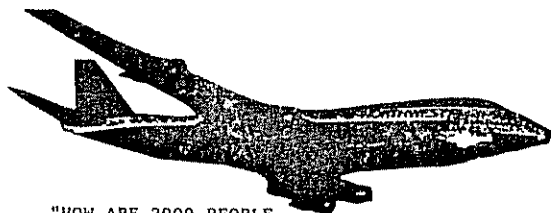
"THE BEST LAID PLANS OF MICE AND MEN OFTEN GO ASTRAY"

SIZE - 27,136 square miles, about half the size of Michigan.

THE GENEALOGICAL CREW RETURNS IN TRIUMPH

Following two weeks of intensive research, six Inishowen workers return home with materials dating back 500 years and covering all the counties of Ireland.

With an ok from Peter Dunne, the guidance of Kevin McGee and the supervision of Pat Dougherty, the FAS crew tackled the deep, dark, dingy, dusty archives in Dublin.

The majority of research was on the clann of O'Doherty. All this material will be indexed and then computerised. It will be kept at O'Dochartaigh Headquarters (about to emerge as the "Donegal Heritage Centre").

This wealth of research came from the National Library, the Registry of Deeds, and the Four Courts archives in Dublin.

Five northern Inishowen girls found themselves undertaking bus rides, jostling foot traffic and evading the automobiles to get to their daily chores. They were Anne Byrne, Mary McLaughlin, Mena Hunter, Rosanne Bonner and Rose Mary Hunter. Supervisor was Pat Dougherty, Inch Island.

These genealogical researchers amassed information dating from the 1500's to the 20th century on the clann O'Dochartaigh. They dug into volumes at the register of deeds. Records were collected on birth which they were not allowed access to in Pahan, Buncrana, Carndonagh, Inch and Burt chaples. Emigration lists were found; mortgages, wills and grants were discovered, clann authors were listed, clann histories originated, land conveyances conveyed, bonds detailed and pockets of O'Doherty's noted all over Ireland.

These researchers and the clann headquarters wish to show their appreciation to Mr Dunne and Mr McGee from the main FAS office in Letterkenny and Mr Heany from our Carndonagh office for their approval and support of this venture.

The extra cost of these 427 hours of research was jointly covered by FAS (formerly AnCo) and the O'Dochartaigh association on Inch Island.

Coming in the lingering bleakness of winter, it offered but the smallest of excitements. Most notable was the one-day lifting of Roman Catholic Church restrictions on weddings during Lent.

The pubs remained firmly shut. The only place to drink legally was at the dog show, a fact that each year turned Dublin into a city of dog lovers.

The Irish writer Anthony Cronin recalled St. Patrick's Day in the old days as "a misery an obstacle to be got over." Then came the Americans.

With the increased popularity of the Dublin parade among American bands over the last two decades, Dublin could be mistaken on the big day for New York, Chicago or Boston. Not only are the pubs now open on St. Patrick's Day, but some are advertising one particular American connection - green beer. The American pizzazz is well received here.

PASSING OF THE DOHERTYS

RICHARD DOUGHERTY, 65, a former Journalist and novelist who was press secretary for George McGovern's 1972 presidential campaign, has died in New York. Dougherty also was a former vice-president of the Metropolitan Museum of Art and was deputy police commissioner of New York City for community relations in the 1950's. Earlier, he worked as the New York bureau chief of the Los Angeles Times. He was a reporter at the New York Herald Tribune from 1948-59 and a national political writer in the paper's Washington bureau from 1964 to 1966. He wrote five novels, including "The Commissioner," which was the basis for the movie and television series "Madigan".

MICHAEL DOUGHERTY, Age 32, died January 4, 1987 in Florida. Michael was born in Saginaw, July 20, 1954. He had lived and attended school in Chic. He served in the 82nd Division of the 325th Airborne Infantry and was employed as a printer for the Tallahassee Democrat. Surviving are wife, Rhonda, son, Derek.

CELIUS DOUGHERTY, a concert pianist and composer of Effort Pa., died at a nursing home at the age of eighty-four. At the height of his career as a pianist, he was part of a two part team with Vincent Ruricka, playing with the Vienna Symphony in Austria in 1955.

LYLA DOHERTY, died on Feb. 5, 1988, wife of the late John E. mother of Timothy, David and Christopher, sister of Mrs Mary O'Neill, six grandchildren.

DEATH OF RATHMORE EXILE IN USA

Beatrice Houlihan, a native of Rathmore Co. Kerry died suddenly at her Bronx residence on September 15, 1987. She was 98 years of age. She emigrated from Ireland in 1907, making only one trip home in 1926 to visit her family.

Beatrice spent the last several years of her life at the residence of her nephew, Seamus O'Doherty and his wife Theresa. She is survived by many nieces and nephews in Ireland and the US, including Seamus O'Doherty, vice-president of the Kerryman's Association, historian of Bronx County AOH president of the Bronx Gaelic League.

ST. PATRICK'S PARTY AT ARNDUTCAS

From practically our first week as researchers of the O'Doherty Clann, we were told of the intention of having a St Patrick's Day party. It was far away then, but it soon crept upon us.

It began by sending out invitations to O'Dohertys in late February. Then St. Patrick's week arrived and the 17th being on a Thursday it was decided to hold the party on Saturday, the 19th. We were asked to come to Inch on Saturday morning to help organise the house and the food.

There were bright fires in the Rocky Mt. room and the Michigan room, all our office materials were cleared out of the Ohio room, instead of letters and computer printouts, we had horses, pigs, cows, sheep and soldiers, the tribute O'Dohertys owed the O'Donnells.

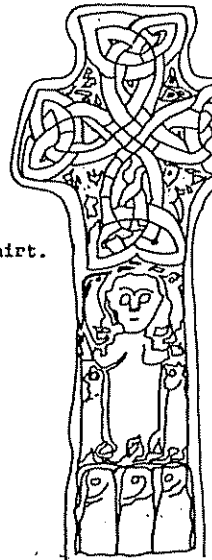

The Donegal Association feels that Eamonn Doherty is a very worthy recipient of the award and that the independent panel of judges made a wise choice from a wide range of nominations.

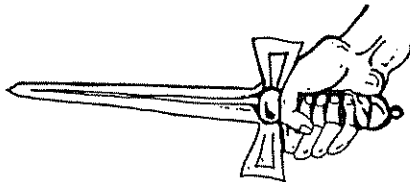
Open letter to the O'Doherty Clann

PROFILE OF EAMONN DOHERTY GARDA COMMISSIONER OF IRELAND (Police Commissioner of Ireland)

The son of a cattle dealer from Bunrana, County Donegal, Eamonn Doherty was educated in St. Columb's College, Derry, and on graduating in 1943 immediately joined the Gardai Siochana. He arrived for training in the Gardai Depot at the Phoenix Park in December and spent a depressing Christmas away from home.

Doherty may, says a colleague, have lingered a little in his career as a garda, serving in Dublin's Pearse Street and Whitehall, but when he started moving he moved fast. After 13 years as a garda he was in 1956 promoted to sergeant. He was assigned to Gardai Headquarters and it was there that he was spotted by the then Commissioner, Dan Costigan.

Doherty worked in the Organisation and Methods Office, in the same building in which he would take the Commissioners chair 30 years later. His promotion was rapid. In 1959 he became an inspector and just two years later he was promoted to Superintendent. He was sent to Washington D.C. for six months, one of the first Senior Officers to be sent abroad for intensive training, and graduated from the F.B.I. National Academy.

In 1968 Doherty was promoted to Chief Superintendent, in the Dublin Central area. He remained at that rank for a decade, becoming an Assistant Commissioner in 1978 and Deputy Commissioner a year later.

The position of Garda Commissioner is not the most secure job on the force. Although the issue of political interference in the force is a cause of recurring controversy, the Commissionership is unique in being a position of direct political appointment and is vulnerable to shifting winds.

When Fianna Fail came to power in 1977 the career of the Commissioner was brought to a premature end. In 1982 another Commissioner, Pat McLaughlin, came a cropper when he was drawn into the row surrounding the tapping of the phones of two journalists, ordered by Minister for Justice, Sean Doherty.

Eamonn Doherty is a married man with five grown children.

It is generally believed within the Gardai Siochana that Justice Minister Gerry Collins will grant Eamonn Doherty an extension beyond retirement age, of at least a year and possibly two. Doherty shrugs off such speculation.
